Record-Chronicle Staff Writer A daring attempt to rob the Lewisville State Bank was thwarted late Monday afternoon when a youthful hold-up man was captured by an unarmed filling station attendant

about a half-mile south of Lewisville.

Roy Rogan 23, employed at the Thomas and Sons service station on Highway 77, apprehended S. A. Brueggemeyer, 22year-old Navy veteran, as he fled on foot after taking \$1,046 in bills from the bank. The exhausted robber had been chased about half a mile across a cornfield by Lewisville High School football players.

Brueggemeyer had entered the bank through an unlocked

side door at about 4:45 p. m. and forced four bank officials into the vault while he scooped up the contents of a cash drawer into a paper sack and attempted to escape. The alarm was sounded when one of the bankers picked up a telephone inside the bank vault, told the operator the bank was being robbed and to sound the alarm.

The youth ran southwest from the bank to the Lewisville Gin Co. plant where he tried to force W. W. Sherrill, co-owner of the gin, and E. G. McCombs to drive him from the scene in a pickup truck. When the men refused, he ran through a comfield toward the high-way, attracting the attention of nearby Lewisville High School football players who gave chase.

He was captured when Rogan heard the shouting and went out to meet Brueggemeyer as he was nearing the highway. The bandit were invited to enjoy the evening had attempted to hide the revolver

floor as he left, Hayes said.

Running around the rear of the bank, he headed for the gin where he found McCombs and Sherrill standing beside the truck. The bandit first approached McCombs owner of the McCombs Hatchery in Lewisville.

"We'd heard the siren and went out to see where the fire was," Mc-Combs said. "We presumed it was a fire as that's what the alarm usually means. He pointed his gun at me and told me to get into the pickup and drive him down the road. I told him it wasn't my pickup and I didn't have the keys. He then turned to Mr. Sherrill and ordered him to drive, Mr. Sherrill walked around the truck and started to get in; then turned and said, 'You can't bluff me. I'm not going with you."
